Former Minister Named Minister Emeritus

The Unitarian Universalist Church of Tucson honored its former minister, the Reverend David A. Johnson, by installing him as Minister Emeritus on Sunday, October 17, 2010, at the 10 a.m. worship service.

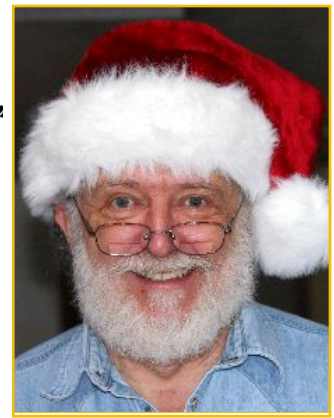
The Rev. Johnson is the longest-serving minister of this 63 year old congregation, where he served from 1973 to 1988. During that time he led the congregation in growth, participated in the establishment of a second congregation in Tucson, the UU Congregation of Northwest Tucson, as well as encouraged the establishment of the UU Congregation of Green Valley and the UU Church of Southeast Arizona in Sierra Vista.

Involved in the local community, Rev. Johnson served on the board of the Pima Council on Aging, serving as its president twice. He worked with Tucson Urban League, and was chair of the Court-appointed independent citizens' committee, which was established to monitor the desegregation of Tucson School District One. He worked as well with the Tucson Ecumenical Council where he was instrumental in establishing an inter-denominational Thanksgiving Day service, and he was active with other group members in the Sanctuary Movement.

Rev. Johnson resigned in 1988 to be minister of the Unitarian Universalist Church in Brookline, Massachusetts, from which he retired in 2003. Today he lives in Providence, Rhode Island, and serves as interim minister in Provincetown, on Cape Cod.

In conjunction with this event, the church has created a fund in Rev. Johnson's honor, for the support of an intern minister at some future date.

Certification of Membership 2011

You can now use the UUA's online system to certify your congregation's membership number. The deadline to complete this process is Tuesday, February 1 at 5 pm PT. Please be aware, there cannot be any extensions on this deadline.

The certified membership number is the basis for determining the number of voting delegates for your congregation at General Assembly 2011, and for calculating your congregation's Annual Program Fund Fair Share (FY 2012) contribution to the UUA. Congregations report this statistic each year before the February 1 deadline as part of the UUA's Bylaws & Rules.

You can find Frequently Asked Questions about the Certification process online here: www.uua.org/leaders/dataservices/faq.

Each congregation has at least one individual authorized as a UUA Data Services Updater who can use the my.UUA.org online system to certify this membership number. Authorized users with confirmed accounts should log in here: my.uua.org/contactinfo.

Or, your congregation can log in to the Data Services Login for Congregations (shared congregational account). The congregation ID is your congregation's 4-digit ID number. Log in at: dyn.uua.org/congregation.

Please note: these shared accounts will be made inactive by the end of 2011. We encourage congregations to use the my.UUA.org system instead, as it will soon be the only login accounts for congregations to report this data. First-time users of my.UUA.org can register here: my.uua.org/accounts

Thoughts from the President

At the fall meeting of UUA District Presidents, we continued the reimagining we had initiated at our previous fall meeting. We are still actively engaged in the work, both collectively and individually, and we wanted to let people know that change was in the air.



My colleagues honored me by allowing me to serve on the committee that drafted the following statement from the District Presidents Association.

Imagine an Association of Congregations that delivers our liberal and liberating faith tradition to a world in need. Imagine a governance structure that enables this to become a reality. Imagine a democratic process where all voices are heard and we honor our covenantal heritage.

The District Presidents Association, in collaboration with our UUA Board of Trustees, recognizes the work that has gone before and that is moving our association forward. There is no hidden agenda or done deal, but we are looking seriously at organizational structures and practices that have been in place for many years, such as

- *The size and selection process for our UUA Board*
- *Co-employment of staff*
- *Redundancy and duplication of policies*
- *A static, inorganic decision-making structure*
- *Inequitable funding formulas*

We recognize that change brings anxiety, but we also recognize a duty to address long-standing constraints and issues in our current system. That duty calls us to take action to make those feared changes, because we believe they will

- *Release the energy of our human capital to do the important work of connecting our congregations to our larger Association*
- *Free more of our leaders to do the work of changing the world*
- *Actively engage more congregations in creating and fulfilling the vision of all of our imaginings*

As should be clear, there are truly substantive changes that are being considered by our leadership and it is our intention to apprise you, our member congregations, at every step. The implications of the changes are far-reaching and may be stirring many thoughts and ideas. I am eager to hear from you, so if you want to discuss what has been stirred up, please do not hesitate to contact me.

From Your Annual Program Fund Representative

As we approach the end of this challenging year, I want to offer my heartfelt thanks to all those congregations who managed to remain “fair share” contributors to the UUA



Annual Program Fund and to the District. It was encouraging to see we remained in the top quartile of giving among districts even though our overall giving is down almost 20 per cent from three years ago.

If your congregation was not able to achieve fair share this past year I do hope you will stretch to make it this year. In a few months many of our congregations will be formulating budgets for the next church year. Please make fair share giving to the UUA and the District a matter of “what’s right not what’s left”. When your church does not give its fair share you are in effect asking your sister congregations to pick up the slack. Remember these aren’t dues you are paying. These are pledges we make as part of our larger identity as Unitarian Universalists just as your individual members make pledges to support their identity in your congregation.

If you have not yet made a pledge for this current fiscal year, I sent your leadership a letter asking you to do so. Like each congregation, this helps the UUA and the District plan out their budgets. Also, after several years of no increase to the suggested fair share per member amount, the UUA will be raising its suggested amount from \$56 to \$58. Please keep this in mind when budgeting for the next fiscal year.

As a reminder, congregations are asked to certify their membership to the UUA by Feb. 1st. There is always some debate on “who to count”. The temptation being to count only those who give or give at a certain level. My philosophy is to err on the side of being more generous in the count, remembering that as a free church we welcome all people regardless of belief, status or means. As one sage reminded me years ago, “if you don’t count them, then they don’t count.”

May we all count our blessings this holiday season.

Bed & Breakfast Adventure on O’ahu

Our First Unitarian Church of Honolulu has just announced plans to offer a second Bed & Breakfast fundraiser, this time scheduled for Presidents’ Day Weekend in February, from the 16th to 23rd. Those who took advantage of this wonderful offer last September will be among the first to tell you not to miss out on what is way more than just a very good deal. Here’s how it works:

The Honolulu congregation will provide seven nights stay in the homes of church members and friends for \$840 for a room for two (\$120/night), or \$490 for a single (\$70/night). And they’d love to be your hosts and guides for a wide spectrum of activities and explorations during your time on their beautiful island. Optional excursions include whale watching tours, a visit to the popular Kapiolani College Farmers’ Market, snorkeling at Hanauma Bay, a visit to the Bishop Museum guided by a feminist anthropologist, a hike up to the Makapu’u Lighthouse, a tour of the Manoa Heritage Center with a docent, and a visit to an ancient Hawaiian temple site and garden of native plants in Kailua.

UUA Trustee Report

As we move through the holiday season and toward the end of our calendar year, I am reminded that we are at the busiest, most involved time of the year for most of our congregations. Preparation of special music, pageants celebrating numerous holidays and traditions, more than full-time work for most of our staff, both professional and lay make this a highlight time of year for many of us beyond the usual holiday fare. I wish each and every one of you a safe and joyous holiday season!

Our PSWD president, Michael Sallwasser is encouraging us to use the term "Our UUA" as opposed to just "the UUA". I like it and I am trying to use it in my own writing and references. Our UUA is much like our congregations at this time of year. It is busy, alive and exciting. We are planning our next board meeting in January. Last year, for the first time, we decided to have our January meeting away from Boston. We met in San Antonio and following legislative events around immigration, we have decided to meet right here in the PSWD in the Phoenix area this coming January. The meeting is scheduled from January 20-23 and for the most part is open to observers. The agenda will be out in early January. Prior to the meeting, many board members are doing a pre-meeting visit to the Tucson area from Monday through Wednesday of that week and will be hosted by folks from No More Deaths who will take members to various sites and meetings to educate and inform members on these issues in Arizona. District Executive, Ken Brown is providing significant help to the board for this meeting.

The 2011 General Assembly in Charlotte will feature a number of programs marking the UUA's fiftieth anniversary. There will be a great deal of activity around this celebration at GA in Charlotte, NC. I am hoping many UUs from the PSWD will make it to Charlotte for this notable event. I believe all the living former presidents of Our UUA will be in attendance for this event. Planned events include a 50th birthday party after the opening celebration, a keynote lecture about Unitarian Universalism's contribution to the development of liberal religion in America, a worship service examining Unitarian Universalism's experience as a "blended" family,



and a panel reflecting on the UUA's social justice achievements in the past 50 years.

Communication has taken some large leaps forward this year. The UU World has dramatically increased coverage of our board meetings and their reports are always available online. You can sign up to get weekly notifications of UU World articles on a variety of topics at <http://www.uuworld.org/subscriptions/index.shtml>. If you are a member of Facebook, the board also has a site on Facebook that you can sign up to get the latest happenings with the board including videos, announcements and more. Additionally, the board will soon be launching its own blog and I will send a link as soon as we have the information.

The financial picture for Our UUA is improving slowly despite the recent events in the national economic picture. We have a balanced budget, albeit at the expense of some programs and staff, as well as a clean opinion from our financial auditors. Management has been very prudent and kept the cuts to the minimum necessary. Remaining staff have picked up extra work to help preserve programs and some programs have had to be reorganized in order to be able to continue. All our congregations can help by maintaining fair share status and continuing to fulfill pledges. Opportunities for individual giving to Friends of the PSWD and Friends of the UUA are available from the respective websites. I hope you will join me in being a Friend to both.

Finally, by February 1st each congregation must recertify its membership and complete the congregational poll. This signifies your intention to continue to be a member congregation of Our UUA. After January 1st the authorized person in your congregation can go online and complete the certification. Details on how to do this will be coming to each congregation in the near future. Keep an eye out for it.

Cool Congregation Wins Energy Oscar!

When it comes to saving energy, Neighborhood Unitarian Universalist Church in Pasadena is a “cool congregation”, according to Interfaith Power and Light. At the November 9th California Interfaith Power and Light (CIPL) 4th Annual Energy Oscar Awards, Neighborhood Church won the 2010 award for Energy Efficiency and Conservation. CIPL helps educate congregations on the theological basis for eco-stewardship and assists them in implementing programs to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions and become more energy efficient.

Caring for the environment and saving energy are not new to Neighborhood Church, which was recognized with the “Green Sanctuary” designation by the Unitarian Universalist Association in March 2010. Neighborhood’s 7th Principle group has worked tirelessly since its inception in 2004 to build awareness of and motivate action on environmental issues while reaching its goal of becoming a “Green Sanctuary.”

Much of Neighborhood’s environmental success is attributed to the collaboration between its 7th Principle group, congregants, ministers, and staff. Besides the usual energy-saving improvements, like replacing incandescent bulbs with CFLs, replacing toilets with high efficiency models, and replacing the Styrofoam at coffee hour with reusable cups, the church has made larger improvements, like participating in a number of energy-saving emerging technologies pilot programs and installing a new water-saving irrigation system. And the list goes on. The biggest collaborative project is the church’s Neighborhood Green Fair, a large-scale environmental awareness event for the community that includes vendors, demonstrations, food, nonprofits, music, prizes, and more and requires roughly 100 volunteers and months of planning.

For its environmental achievements, Neighborhood was profiled in the Pasadena Water and Power news-

letter and Interfaith Power and Light newsletter and received recognition of meritorious achievement in water conservation by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California. Alyssa Bellew, Director of Administration, for Neighborhood Church, advises churches beginning the process to get an energy audit, which doesn’t have to be fancy or expensive, and to develop a close working relationship with your local water and power representative. Also, both Interfaith Power and Light and Energy Star have excellent resources for congregations, including tips and energy saving calculator tools. In the last year, Neighborhood reduced water consumption by 27%, with 50% improvement from summer of 2009 to summer of 2010.

In 2 years, Neighborhood has reduced energy consumption by 18,240 kWh, roughly 10%, which is enough energy to make 100,320 espressos and 3,648,000 blended margaritas. That’s cool.
